**Adult Volunteers**

In 2011, the Grand Canyon Council registered 20,844 adult volunteers. These remarkable men and women graciously gave their time and talent to promote youth in local Arizona communities. The fact is, Scouting's programs would cease to exist if dedicated community leaders did not serve as Den Leaders, Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Committee Chairs, and Merit Badge Counselors, to name a few. Every adult represents hundreds of volunteer hours every year to thousands of young people.

Community Service

In 2011, the Grand Canyon Council awarded 1,248 Boy Scouts the Eagle Scout Rank. Our Eagle Scouts invested 213,825 service hours back into our community through their service projects. These service projects helped to save Arizona's communities \$3,496,043. The end result is a strong investment in youth character development and a healthy community.

In working to serve all youth populations, the Grand Canyon Council achieved success in 2011 through our Outreach programs:

Soccer and Scouting: Served 1,545 youth in 47 Units throughout Maricopa and Yuma Counties

Juvenile Diversion: Served 90 youth in 13 Pods at the Adobe Mountain School

After-School: Served 300 youth in the AM/PM After-school program with the City of Peoria

Foster Care Initiative: 76 youth served in Foster care programs with the Sunshine Homes and refugees from Somalia.

Inner City New Unit Development Initiatives: Served 150 youth in the "at risk" neighborhoods of South Scottsdale and Central Phoenix.
